

Easy 5 Step Keyword Research...for FREE!

Plenty of people get stuck trying to find good keyword to either use to build out a new site or to build out a current site with additional content. It's really not difficult at all and too many of the "Guru's" can make it sound even more confusing than it needs to be. What I want to do in this email is briefly explain to you how you can perform keyword research for FREE, without having to use tools like <u>Market Samurai</u>. (Once you understand the concept you can move on to paid tools to save you a ton of time)

Step 1: Think of a concept

This can literally be anything. Maybe it's the car seat you strapped your kid into to go to the store yesterday. Maybe it's the fencing you never finished in the backyard. For me in this example, I'm going to use "dog food" (My buddy has a Rottweiler and was complaing about the cost of dog food recently)

Step 2: Google Keyword Tool

Head over to the <u>Google Keyword Tool</u>, make sure you're logged into your account for Google AdWords, and use the search for the keyword you're looking for. This will give you a bunch of results. You now need to look on the left side under MATCH TYPES and make sure [Exact] is selected and Broad is de-selected.

Match Types (2) Broad (Exact] Phrase"

Now go to the results and click on "Global Monthly Searches" so that it's sorted by exact match search volume, highest to lowest. You're going to want to go to Page 2 or 3, until you see global searches in the 3,000 range or less. (More is better, but most of the keywords with more than 3,000 exact match searches will already be taken and have high seo competition!)

At the bottom of the page, select Show Rows: 100 so that you get 100 results on the page. Then go back up to the top and select all of the keywords you see on the page and select Download > Selected and you'll have your keywords in a spreadsheet. (You can also check each keword from here manually)

Step 3: GoDaddy Domain checking


<u>Head over to GoDaddy</u> and take all 100 results from the spreadsheet and copy/paste into the form and search for available domains, only looking at .com, .net and .org EXACT match domains!

Make a note of the domains available back on your spreadsheet and delete those that were not available.

Also delete any keywords that do not have a cpc value from the GKT of \$0.80 or better and delete those where the green bar for "competition" is less than half full, left to right. (Remember this green bar represents ADVERTISER competition...those that will pay you for the clicks. You'd like this to be high!)

Step 4: Search for Google Competitive Pages

Go to Google and search for your keywords in quotes. For my example, I've found freedogfoodsamples.org available, so I'll search Google for "free dog food samples" Make sure that you have less than 200,000 results when the search is in quotes. (I found 49,200)



Step 5: Check First Page Competition

Now, search Google without the quotes for the main keyword you're targeting. This is the "subjective" part of determining whether a keyword is worth going for or not. You're going to want to look for holes in the competition. This could include article directories, general sites that aren't specifically about dogs, etc. (Sites like Buzzle, Amazon, ezinearticles, goarticles, squidoo, etc.) You're going to want to also look to see if there are any other exact match domains on the first or second page. If they are, take a look at Yahoo Site Explorer to determine how many backlinks they have.

Getting good at this comes with time and if you've done everything else right, it's only a part of the overall process. You'll want to "rank" your chances of getting on the first page based on the competition. For "free dog food samples" I'm giving us a 3/5, due to the fact not all the titles have exact match, not all the main websites are related, etc.

Our Results:

free dog food samples freedogfoodsamples.org 1,600 exact match searches \$3.28 estimated cpc 49,200 competing pages 3/5 chance to rank

How much will this site earn? It's really hard to estimate. This is what we do: 10% of searches will hit our page (Assuming we'll get in the #4 - #10 spot)

Estimate 5% CTR Estimate 50% CPC Add 50% for long-tail searches that will find your site.

That means we guess that this site will earn us \$19.68 applying the formula above.

We hope that helps you in your keyword research!

Note: You won't be able to find available keywords on your first try. I worked backwards, meaning I found the keyword first and went back to fill in the numbers in this report.
